

What is FUNIÑO?



FUNIÑO (otherwise known as Mini-fußball) is a variation of a children's and youth football designed with the aim of developing and promoting game intelligence among children and youth players. FUNIÑO is played using four mini goals on a pitch measuring approximately 32x25 metres. Two teams of three face off against each other. Two goals are positioned on each base line, the six metres in front of these is called the shooting zone. Players are only allowed to score from within this zone. Through regular repetition and frequent contact with the ball, children can learn how to approach one-on-ones as well as various situations during play.
